# Nurses on Boards in California: Our Numbers Are Up!

We're excited to report that the number of nurses serving on boards in California went up 20% over the last quarter. In July, 266 nurses were registered on the Nurses on Boards Coalition site. That number has grown to 320. We've still got a long way to go in order to meet our goal of 1,000 nurses serving on boards by 2020, so please be

The number of nurses who have registered an interest in board service on the site has also increased. The NOBC site now includes free resources, including articles and training webinars. # California BRN Publishes 2016 Survey of Registered Nurses

The California Board of Registered Nursing has published the results of the 2016 Survey of Registered Nurses. The full



report is available on their website, <u>www.rn.ca.gov</u>. The report highlights some of the changes occurring in the California RN workforce, including:

- 86.2% of RNs with a CA license and living in the state are employed in nursing
- The mean age of working RNs in CA is 45 years
- 11.9% of the workforce is male

In August 2017, an exciting commission was created to ensure California's workforce is ready to meet the population's current and

future health needs. The California Future Health Workforce Commission will meet over the next year to draft a master plan to strengthen the health workforce, with an emphasis on primary care, behavioral health, and care for the aging.


